A Reading from the letter to the Romans

For the creation waits with eager longing for the revealing of the children of God; for the creation was subjected to futility, not of its own will but by the will of the one who subjected it, in hope that the creation itself will be set free from its bondage to decay and will obtain the freedom of the glory of the children of God. We know that the whole creation has been groaning in labour pains until now; and not only the creation, but we ourselves, who have the first fruits of the Spirit, groan inwardly while we wait for adoption, the redemption of our bodies. For in hope we were saved. Now hope that is seen is not hope. For who hopes for what is seen? But if we hope for what we do not see, we wait for it with patience. *Romans* 8:19-25.

The Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to Mark

Glory to you Lord Jesus Christ.

Now when the Pharisees and some of the scribes who had come from Jerusalem gathered around him.

they noticed that some of his disciples were eating with defiled hands, that is, without washing them.

(For the Pharisees, and all the Jews, do not eat unless they thoroughly wash their hands, thus observing the tradition of the elders;

and they do not eat anything from the market unless they wash it; and there are also many other traditions that they observe, the washing of cups, pots, and bronze kettles.)

So the Pharisees and the scribes asked him, 'Why do your disciples not live according to the tradition of the elders, but eat with defiled hands?'

He said to them, 'Isaiah prophesied rightly about you hypocrites, as it is written, "This people honours me with their lips,

but their hearts are far from me;

in vain do they worship me,

teaching human precepts as doctrines."

You abandon the commandment of God and hold to human tradition.'

Then he called the crowd again and said to them, 'Listen to me, all of you, and understand:

there is nothing outside a person that by going in can defile, but the things that come out are what defile.'

When he had left the crowd and entered the house, his disciples asked him about the parable.

He said to them, 'Then do you also fail to understand? Do you not see that whatever goes into a person from outside cannot defile,

since it enters, not the heart but the stomach, and goes out into the sewer?' (Thus he declared all foods clean.)

And he said, 'It is what comes out of a person that defiles.

For it is from within, from the human heart, that evil intentions come: fornication, theft, murder,

adultery, avarice, wickedness, deceit, licentiousness, envy, slander, pride, folly.

All these evil things come from within, and they defile a person.' *Mark 7.1-8, 14-23* For the Gospel of the Lord. **Praise to you Lord Jesus Christ**

How do we keep ourselves "unstained by the world"? Through prayer and listening to Christ's voice above all others, especially the voices of the world that tempt us away from the voice of our Lord.

- Make clean our hearts, O God, and renew a right spirit within us that we may seek to serve you in joy and gladness.

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Dean's Doings

At Clergy Conference back in June we had some time with Michael Wood, a priest who for the last 20 years or so has focused on emergent processes - so we were introduced to talking circles and Open Space Technology. Open Space is a process in which the group, sparked by a central original question, sets the agenda. I led a group conversation about Restorative Justice, and on Wednesday we had the follow up on that conversation, exploring how we might bring restorative practices into the life of our diocese.

Different from mediation which seeks a compromise everyone can live with, or from more punitive forms of redress, restorative practice aims to lay on the table what has been broken in a relationship or situation, and seeks to repair what is broken. It's rooted and grounded in our call to be people of reconciliation, just as Jesus is our reconciliation with God. The group came up with some future directions around awareness raising, knowing that we're just at the very beginning of the journey as a diocese. We also concluded that there's some groundwork to do in opening space for frank and respectful conversations - like in talking circles.

Yesterday a handful of cathedral folk attended the Abbey Feast at which a prayer tree was blessed and delicious food shared. Today we'll be commencing the Season of Creation, which runs through the month of September. We'll be blessing a prayer tree, part of the Anglican Communion Forest, at the service at 3pm, which will later be planted outside. Do come along to this Diocesan event to hear Tony Rinaudo speak about his experience with regreening!

Launch of the Prayer Trees St Paul's Cathedral, Sale **3pm on Sunday 1**st **Sept** With guest speaker, Tony Rinaudo, agriculturalist, missionary, and author of The Forest Underground: Hope for a Planet in Crisis, Christian Book of the Year, 2022 Guest Speaker, TONY RINAUDO

"Rinaudo served as an agriculturalist and missionary with 'Serving in Mission' in Niger Republic from 1981 to 1999. There, he oversaw long-term rural development and periodic, large-scale relief programs. In this Sahel region of Niger, where tree-planting efforts were failing, he "discovered root systems remained alive underground, even in the harshest, desert-like landscapes. To encourage the 'underground forest' to grow into trees, he just needed to prune and manage the tree shoots. He inspired farmers to carry on this work over the years. Rinaudo's pioneering technique is called Farmer Managed Natural Regeneration, or FMNR." The FMNR website describes the technique as a "low-cost land restoration"

technique used to combat poverty and hunger amongst poor subsistence farmers by increasing food and timber production and resilience to climate extremes". He consequently earned the nickname "the Forest Maker". At the UN's global climate talks in Katowice, Poland, in 2018, it was recognised that "6M hectares of land have been regenerated under FMNR, totalling 240M trees [and that] the reforestation of he landscape can be seen on satellite images from space".
